Concept: Power and Conflict

Students finish reading A Christmas Carol

For English Literature Paper 2, students read a selection of poems from an anthology entitled 'Power and Conflict'. The anthology poems are London, The Charge of the Light Brigade, Exposure, Bayonet Charge, Remains, War Photographer, Checking Out Me History and Ozymandias. Students also practise the skills of responding to an unseen poem.

Home Learning:

Students are expected to complete one hour of English home learning every week from their knowledge organiser and one piece of reading or revision home learning every day.

Key Questions:

Meaning:

- What is the poem about?
- What themes or messages is the poet exploring?
- What are the similarities/ differences between the poems?

Language:

- What poetic techniques does the poet use and what effect do these create?
- Are there any patterns in the language/ techniques that the poet uses?

Structure and form:

- Is the poems written in stanzas? What is the effect of this?
- Is the poem a sonnet, dramatic monologue or another form?
- Does the poem use any other structural methods, such as enjambment or caesura, for effect?
- Who is the narrator and how do they feel about what they are writing about?

Context:

- When was the poem written?
- What do you know about the poet?
- How have the poet's experiences affected their writing?

Diagnosis

- Retrieval activities during Recall It tasks.
- Reading response based on War Photographer and one other poem

Therapy

- Whole-class feedback
- Sharing model responses
- DIRT tasks
- Peer to peer support

Students will:

- Be able to recall relevant information about what the poems are about
- Be able to recall specific textual details and quotations to support their ideas about texts
- Be able to make thoughtful and perceptive inferences based on the textual evidence they have chosen
- Be able to use PETAL effectively to structure their ideas in relation a question on the text
- Be able to structure a comparative argument in an extended essay so that it makes sense

Testing

- Students will complete a reading assessment comparing two poems
