Today has been a positive end to what has been a busy but productive year. When I reflect on 2023 I am very proud of what we have achieved as a school and I am sure that many students will also have good memories of the year. Free School Meals

Whether your child is eligible for free school meals depends on their age, where you live and your income. Your child may be eligible if you are claiming any of the following benefits: Income support

Income-based jobseeker's allowance

The guaranteed element of pension credit

Income-related employment and support allowance

Working tax credit run-on – paid for four weeks after stopping work

Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Child tax credit, as long as you don't also receive working tax credit and earn no more than £16,190

Universal credit, if someone applied since April 2018 and their income is less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including benefits). If someone applied for UC before then, there is no income threshold.




News from the Library!

SCHOOL SYNERGY Parents & Carers

School Synergy is a solution to help manage communication between home and school. With School Synergy, school news and information specific to your child is shared in real time.

School to Parent Communication

School may send an email and/or text about a variety of topics such as:

- Behaviour concerns and achievements
- Attendance gueries
- School news and events or important announcements
- Individual teacher communication.
- Reports, Progress and Assessment Information

These messages will often include a secure link where you can view a detailed message. Your school will share the email address and mobile number(s) being used. A copy of all text messages and emails also appear in the Communication section on the Parent Portal to ensure that you never miss a

Parent to School Communication

Sometimes it's difficult to know who to contact within school about a specific request.

With School Synergy you can complete a contact form from the school website or directly within the Parent Portal. This message is received and routed appropriately to the correct person within school and ensures that a response is given.

Parent Portal

The Parent Portal is a single place where you can view school information for one or more children. With a Parent Portal Code provided by school, you can register and view attendance. behaviour and achievements, parent letters, school calendar, parent communication, homework and more.

Your school will provide details on the features currently available.



Safeguarding: Top Tips for setting up parental controls on new devices:

7/10 parents use technical controls on their child's devices to manage access to content; such safeguards can be an enormous asset: helping parents and carers to manage what their child might encounter online while allowing young people to happily use their new gizmo to start exploring the digital world.

Though extremely useful once in place, such parental controls vary from device to device and can often be confusing or difficult to set up. The attached guide outlines what defences are available on some of the most popular devices around: advice that will probably come in particularly handy at this time of year!

When it comes to the Festive period there are additional safeguarding risks that you and your family may not have thought about:

Isolation – Children can feel cut off from their peers and at times these are their support networks. **Over indulgence –** are the adults around the children drinking too much alcohol, are the children witnessing this or alcohol readily available in the house and posing a risk that children may drink it. **Home Alone –** visiting family and thinking that your child is old enough or mature enough to be at home alone – think twice!

Changes in routine/ new people visiting- is this stressful for your children, are these new people safe?

These and other issues don't usually come first when you think about time off over Christmas and having time with the family, but they are worth a thought and a reminder to our families about keeping our children safe. SETTING UP PARENTAL NTROLS ON NEW DEVICES

In children's eagerness to start enjoying new digital gadgets immediately, it can be easy to averlook setting up the type of parental controls that can help to protect them online. If you don't sort those out from the very starr, it can be an uphili battle - technologically and psychologically - to impose such controls later. Here's our rundown of what to look for when setting up the various internet-enabled devices that might be lurking under the tree at this time of year.

INCORRECT

PARENT CODE

IPHONE

If your child's lucky enough to be getting their own iffnore, parental controls can help avoid issues like screen addiction and unsuitable content. Oo into the settings and scrol down to "Screen Time". From here you can customise important settings including time limits on using the device, communication restrictions and content blockers. You can also lock your changes behind a passcade.

android

With Android devices, Google's
Family Link app is your friend.
You'd need a Google account - and a separate one for your child, which you should use when lint settling up the device. Then, in Family Link an your own device, select Add Child' and enter their account details. This lets you specify limits on daily usage, restrict certain apps, block particular content and more.

PLAYSTATION

rou can prop for a PlayStation You can prop for a Playstation before it's even unwrapped.

At my.account.sony.com, create an account, then go to Account Management is Family Management.

Add Family Member to set up your child's account, which you'll use to sign in on the console. You can restrict the age ratings of the games they can play and who they can talk to. On the PSS, you can make exceptions for any games you think are acceptable despite their high age rating.

IPAD

Pad parental controls are identical to those an iPhones. However, if you've got a shared lamily iPad and want to ensure your children aren't seeing anything age. Incoprepriate after you hand them the device, there's a feature coiled Guided Access (under Settings.)

XBOX

The Xbos Family Settings app helps you manage which games your child can play (and when). You'll need to set up the canade with your own account and then add a child profile. Make sure your account's password protected, so your child can't after your choices later. You'll be walked through the functions at setup, but you can also reach them manually via Settings + Account + Family Settings.

your phane, and you'll be shown how to link it to the console. Once that's done, you can limit how long your child can play each day, decide what age ratings are permitted and more. You'll also get weekly updates on how often they've used the device. These controls are accessible through the comsole itsel but the app is usually easier.

WINDOWS 11 PCS

On Windows II, account management is key. Set up the device with your own account as the admin. Then go to Settings > Accounts > Family and Other Users and create your child's account (if you've aiready done this on a previous PC, just log in with those details). Microsoft Family Safety (either the app or the site) then lets you control screen time, what content children our view and mans.

CHROMEBOOKS

Chromebooks' parental controls are managed via the Family Link app. Unlike an Android device, however, you need set up the Chromebook with your own account first, then add your child's. Go to Settings : People > Add Person and input your child's Google account details (or create a new account). Your child can then log in, and you can monitor what they're up to via Family Link.

Like Phones, parental controls for Macs are managed via the Screen Time tattings. Again, the crux here is to set yourself up as the administrator before adding any child accounts. In the settings, took for Users & Groups to create your child's account, then - while on their profile - use the screen time options to place any boundaries around apps, usage and who your child can communicate with (and vice versa).

SMART TVS

Smart TVs typically have their own individual parental controls. One of the most popular brands is Semsung – and on their TVs, you can control the content on their risk, you can contact the content available to your child, in the Settings menu, under 'Broadcasting', you can lock channels and restrict content by its age rating. Even this lan't foolproof, however, some apps (like YouTube) might still let children access unsuitable

12 Days of Crime Prevention — Christmas 2023

Keep your home secure

- Securely lock all doors and windows before going out or to bed. Use a timer device to switch lights on after dark.
- Don't put presents under the tree until the last possible moment—and close curtains so your gifts can't be seen from the street.
- Mark your postcode on new presents with a UV pen. Note down the serial number and record it at www.lmmobilse.com so if it is ever stolen, you're more likely to get it back.
- After Christmas, remove any trace of expensive gift packaging by taking discarded boxes to the tip or recycling centre.

Keep your car safe

- Check your fob has done its job—don't assume your vehicle is secure, always check door and windows are locked before you walk away.
- Remove valuables such as sat navs, MP3 players, laptops, tablets, coats and loose change before leaving the vehicle.
- Wipe away tell-tale suction marks from the windscreen—this may alert a thief to your sat nav being hidden inside the vehicle.
 - Don't advertise what you've bought by leaving gifts on show while you return to the shopslock everything away in the book. Take shopping inside immediately when you get home.

Car thieves

- Don't leave your vehicle unattended with the engine running while it defrosts—a thief could drive off with it.
- Stay with your vehicle and if you're in a rush, use de-icing spray and a scraper to speed up a process.
- Sit inside your vehicle whilst the heater de-mists the windscreen.
- Claims on insurance policies can be affected if the vehicle owner is deemed partly responsible for the theft.

Socialise safety

- Pubs, restaurants and other venues will be crowded, so don't hang bags over the back of your chair and keep wallets and purses close to your body.
- Have fun and drink sensibly—binge drinking and excessive drinking at home before a night out puts you at risk of crime. Never leave drinks unattended or accept them from strangers.
- Find out the times of the last tram, train or bus home, or pre-book a taxi from a local licensed operator.
- · Never drive under the influence.



- Keep handbags closed and close to you, and wallets out of back pockets.
- Try not to overload yourself with bags and coats.
- Don't leave pushchairs, shopping bags or trolleys unattended. Take personal belongings with you into changing rooms.
- Be discreet when handling cash and cards at the till and at cash machines—put them away immediately and keep an eye on who is around.
