# Message from the Headteacher

**Dear Parents and Carers** 

I was really proud of our Meadow Park students today as they demonstrated really well all of our values. You will possibly have seen local media coverage of an isolated incident at Meadow Park on Wednesday. I would like to stress that the welfare of our students and wider school community is our upmost priority. We have a zero-tolerance approach to knives in school. I can confirm that I took the decision to permanently exclude the student involved. As this is a police matter, I am unable to comment further. As part of the West Midlands Police programme to tackle knife and vape crimes, we hosted a vape / knife arch at Meadow Park School today. All students walked through the metal detector and bag searches conducted. This was unannounced, for obvious reasons, and I was delighted that zero knives; and zero vapes were found. The Police were very complimentary about our students, in particular how polite and patient they were. They were also pleased that no weapons or vapes were found. Some cans of 'pop' and / or energy drinks were confiscated which will be returned to the families. Please can I take this opportunity to remind you that we do not allow fizzy bottles or cans or 'pop' in school; neither do we allow energy drinks. Thank you for your support

### Inner Spark Workshop



On Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> March, all of Year 7, 9 and 10 took part in a mindset workshop with inspiring life coach, Ricardo Erasmus. In his workshop, Ricardo discussed his own journey of success and how the Southern African term 'Ubuntu' played a key part in his development. The word means "I am because we are" and speaks to the sense of community that we try to emulate here at Meadow Park.

Students shared moments when they reached out to others and the value of that. They learnt about various people who have also used the idea of Ubuntu to make a positive impact in their lives. 





# REMINDERS



### New Parent App and School Communication

Please sign up to our new parent portal MyChildAtSchool (MCAS).



DON'T FORGET to enable push notifications for the MyChildAtSchool app on your phone so you can see all emails and letters the school sends you.

All schools in the Trust are using Bromcom and MCAS so for Meadow Park School, it means MCAS replaces School Synergy.

MCAS is now live, so as soon as you sign up you will be able to see your child's information. As School Synergy is linked to our old MIS it is no longer updating, therefore in order to view your child's timetable, see their attendance and behaviour points you will need to sign up to MCAS.

You have access to all the same information as you had in School Synergy. MCAS allows us to securely share your child's/children's achievement points, attendance, school reports, letters and school diary whenever you wish. The portal also provides general useful information about the school such as flash announcements. This will be our **primary means of communication** with you, from now on. Please make sure you enable notifications for MCAS as this is the way we will send you emails and letters.

To login to the MCAS Parent Portal, we have enabled you to 'self-sign on'. All you will need for this is your email address that the school has on record for you. Enter the school postcode CV34BD (without a space) or use our identifier 15028. Search for Meadow Park School.

#### School Communication

All communication from school is now via Bromcom and if you sign up to the parent portal MCAS then you will receive notifications from the school via the app. You can view all letters and emails, past and present, in MCAS. If you don't have the app then you will receive a normal email. Please add '15028@bromcomcloud.com' to your address book in order to prevent messages being blocked by your spam/junk filters.

#### How to Self-Sign Up for Parents

Parents and carers can access the MCAS Parent Login screen in two ways:

- 1. From within your web browser type www.mychildatschool.com
- Download the free MyChildAtSchool parent app from either the Apple App Store or Google Play.

When you use the parent portal for the first time you will need to Sign-Up. Full instructions have been emailed home or they can be found on our website.




### Safeguarding: Understanding the Manosphere / Lessons from 'Adolescence'

With all the buzz around Netflix's latest Drama Series Adolescence - There is no better time

to highlight the dangers that the wrong messages received through social media can have on an individual. It demonstrates how social media, online platforms and gaming forums can expose young boys and men to communities promoting extreme views of masculinity, relationships and gender roles. Although parts of these 'spaces' centre around the ideas of self-improvement and fitness, many dip into misogyny, anti-feminism and toxic masculinity, often cloaking their messages as 'truths' about dating and society

This mini-series is a tough watch for parents, but an eye opener for sure! Now wonder it has been recorded as the biggest audience for ANY streaming TV Show in the UK in a single week!



This week we are asking parents to read up on the 'language' of Emojis and what our teenagers are REALLY talking about in their chat logs.

By recognising this de-coded language, we can:

- Identify early signs that a teenager is engaging with harmful online content.
- Encourage open conversations about healthy masculinity and relationships.
- Promote digital literacy, helping young people critically evaluate online narratives.
- Challenge misogynistic and extremist ideas before they become deeply ingrained.

Understanding the symbols and language used in these spaces is not about policing how teenagers communicate but about guiding them towards balanced perspectives and ensuring they are not drawn into extreme or harmful ideologies.

Please take the time to look at the attached emoji – guides and reconsider how often you check your child's communication(s) on their phones and devices. As always, if you have any concerns with your child – talk to us at Meadow Park School to find out how we can help.

#### Common Manosphere Emojis and Their Meanings

In manosphere spaces, emojis are a coded way of expressing belief, reinforcing stereotypes or subtly passing off controversial ideas. Here are some of the most common emojis and their meanings in various manosphere subcultures:

#### General Manosphere Emojis

(Wolf)

6	(Flexed Biceps)	Stands for being a strong, dominant man, often linked to gym culture and the idea of being a 'high-status' man.		
۵	(Fire)	Used to praise someone for agreeing with manosphere beliefs or sharing an opinion that supports them.		
•	(Red Circle)	Symbolises 'red pill' thinking – the idea that men need to 'wake up' to what they see as an unfair system working against them.		
•	(Black Circle)	Represents 'black pill' beliefs, which say that men who aren't naturally attractive (so-called 'Chads') have no real chance in dating.		
$\Theta$	(Skull)	Used to show extreme hopelessness, especially in incel groups, suggesting they've given up on dating.		
4	(Cold Face)	Shows emotional detachment, often linked to the idea that men should be tough and avoid showing feelings.		
Women and Dating				
<u></u>	(Crown)	Used to show dominance, often linked to the idea that 'men are kings.'  Sometimes used to mock men seen as too submissive to women.		
2°	(Gorilla)	Represents extreme masculinity, sometimes used jokingly to suggest raw strength and dominance.		
1.	(Snake)	Used to insult men who support feminism or gender equality, calling them traitors.		
6	(Money Bag)	Stands for the belief that wealth equals power and makes a man more attractive to women.		
•	(Upside down face)	Used sarcastically to mock feminist views or men who don't follow manosphere		
Gender and Relationships				
X	(Dress / High Heel)	Used to refer to women in a stereotypical or objectifying way.		
100	(Cat Face / Cat)	Used as an insult towards women, sometimes implying they are lonely or undesirable.		
4	(Wilted Flower)	Suggests a woman is 'past her prime,' often used to criticise women over 30 in discussions about dating and relationships.		
<b>∅</b>	(Baby Bottle)	Used to mock men who are seen as too emotional or dependent on women, often calling them 'weak' or 'beta males.'		
200	(Unicorn)	Represents the idea of a 'perfect' woman—someone who is submissive, young,		
Mocking & Insults				
8	(Clown Face)	Used to make fun of men who are seen as overly supportive of women, feminism, or progressive ideas.		
•	(Monkey Face)	An insult aimed at men who are considered weak or who follow mainstream beliefs without questioning them.		
<b>©</b>	(Clown Face and World)	Suggests that society has become ridiculous or 'broken' because of feminism and progressive values.		
Red Pill and Incel Terms				
٠	(Hot Pepper)	Sometimes used to describe an attractive woman, but often with a negative meaning, suggesting she is manipulative or dangerous.		
*	(Puzzle Piece)	Refers to trying to 'figure out' women or understand dating like it's a game or a code to crack.		
se .	(Rocket)	Symbolises rising in status, wealth, or power.
