Message from the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers

We are well and truly into Autumn now, with the weather getting more blustery and the darker morning and nights creeping in. Please can you speak with your chid about road safety to ensure that they travel to and from school carefully, particularly with the darker mornings and after school. Please can I also remind you that students should not be wearing hoodies at school, including at break or lunchtimes. Our Behaviour Policy outlines the appropriate uniform and refers to students wearing a coat over the top of their blazers for the colder or wetter weather. We do have a selection of coats that are cleaned and pre-loved which you are welcome to select from free of charge if cost is a barrier. We run a uniform swap shop on a monthly basis and we will be adding coats to this, so if you would like to select an item for free, please do so; equally if you have any items, including coats that you would like to donate we will ensure they go to a family who would benefit from this. Thank you to everyone who has already donated items, it is very much appreciated.

At Meadow Park School, we have a big emphasis on rewarding students, through positive phone calls home, rewards cards, House Points, prizes, treats and even reward trips. Each Friday, in my whole school assembly, I run through the House points and rewards that students have earned. All students have a reward card which they should have on their desk for each lesson and staff select students who have demonstrated excellent attitudes towards their learning or have

demonstrated qualities linked to our school values. They can choose to either redeem them at one of our reward shops which is run each lunchtime by our Sixth Form students, with a range of smaller items available. Students have the choice of redeeming for smaller items or saving up their rewards for the larger items on offer. All reward cards are then entered into our weekly prize draw and one of the highlights of the whole school assembly is when I draw, live on air, the winning card. Students whose cards are pulled out can then pick from a range of high street and online vouchers, worth anywhere between £5-£15. One of the ultimate accolades is being nominated for an award and some of you have received invitations to our annual Awards Evening. This is an invitation only event where those nominated are invited to attend with their families. Students will know that they have been nominated for something - they just do not know what award they will be receiving! I look forward to seeing families in a few weeks time at this event.

I hope that Storm Amy didn't spoil your weekend plans and thankfully the calm after the storm seems to be here for the rest of the week.

Talk the Talk

We had a great visit from Talk the Talk on Tuesday 23 September , running workshops for the whole of Year 11. The day focused on the oracy skills of speaking and listening: students started by talking about themselves, then each other and developed into giving a full 'PEEEP' talk about a contentious issue both as a team and individually. The questions posed (and expertly answered) by Year 11 included the extent to which AI is helpful, the impact of social media on young people, whether our curriculum adequately represents the beautiful diversity of our school body ... and, of course, whether or not pineapple belongs on a pizza!

The techniques students were taught – considering content but also both the visual and vocal components of delivery, for example – were clearly on display throughout the day, and several of the staff running the workshops commented on the students' positive engagement and speaking skills: "From being unwilling to talk at the beginning she volunteered to share her story and did so well" "Kyrell was a superstar today. Are you entitled?

If you do not qualify for most benefits (also known as having 'no recourse to public funds'), your child may still be eligible for free school meals.

Contact school or the local authority to find out more.

We can help you apply online.
Ask for details.

Do you know if you qualify for additional support?
Please speak to a member of the House Team to see what support might be available.

Your child may be able to get free school meals if you get any of the following:

- ⇒ Income Support
- ⇒ Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- ⇒ Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- ⇒ Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- ⇒ The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- ⇒ Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- ⇒ Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- ⇒ Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who get paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.

As a school, we can offer food parcels to families.

Please sign up to our parent portal MyChildAtSchool (MCAS).



DON'T FORGET to enable push notifications for the MyChildAtSchool app on your phone so you can see all emails and letters the school sends you.

MCAS allows us to securely share your child's achievement points, attendance, behaviour, school reports, letters and school diary whenever you wish. This is our primary means of communication with you, so please make sure you enable notifications for MCAS as this is the way we will send you emails and letters.

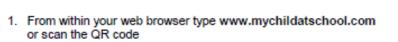
To login to the MCAS Parent Portal, we have enabled you to 'self-sign on'.

When you use the parent portal for the first time you will need to Sign-Up. Full instructions can be found on our website.

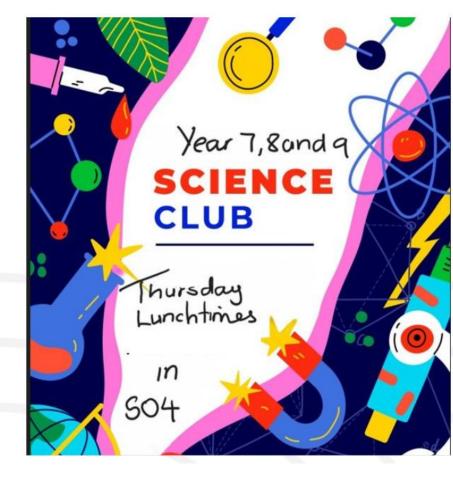
School Communication





Conspiracy Theories

Recently misinformation, disinformation and conspiracy theories have been recognised as safeguarding harms – This week we wanted to share with parents a guid around conspiracy theories. Although they might seem far-fetched, for many people they are very convincing – especially when presented by persuasive influencers or sensationalist videos online. The guide unpacks the risks, including isolation, anxiety, and exposure to extremist content, that can arise when conspiracies go unchecked.

It also highlights how conspiracy theories can erode critical thinking and trust in reliable sources – including schools, families, and the media. It gives practical advice for nurturing curiosity, encouraging scepticism, and safeguarding children's digital experiences.



Free ONLINE Safety Workshop via NSPCC

VPNS – What are they and why do I need to know?

Virtual Private Network (VPN's) use has increased following the changes to online safety in the U.K where there has been increased control over safety filters and protection on ageinappropriate content.

The benefits of using a VPN are to improve privacy on public wi-fi, adding protection (especially if you are online shopping/ banking). The dangers of having a VPN would be the ability to bypass safety features and allow access to graphic age-inappropriate content.

Please take a look at the attached guide to hear how it explains the dangers of untrustworthy providers, malware threats and the false sense of security the VPNs may give children. It also provides top tips from checking devices to having open conversations for parents to guide safe and responsible online behaviour.
